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Success in your paper

Paper aim

This paper builds on BUSS506 and examines how business can act responsibly in a contemporary environment. It provides students with the tools to evaluate and address ethical issues at an individual and organisational level. Different approaches to doing business in a socially and environmentally responsible way are considered.

Learning outcomes

By the end of this paper, the student will be able to:

- 1. Use appropriate tools to analyse and evaluate business situations where environmental, social and economic concerns arise
- 2. Debate and defend rationales for responsible business practice
- 3. Determine the drivers, and identify business opportunities, for socially and environmentally sustainable practice.
- 4. Through studying business practice examples, derive and defend business strategies and management practices to advance responsible business practice.

Content

 - Ethics and worldviews (including Maori and indigenous)
 - Frameworks for ethical decision making (including core principles of Te Tiriti o Waitangi)
 - Applying the framework to individual and organisational decision-making

 - Responsible Production Management

Reconsideration

Requirements	 The Ethical Analysis Essay requires you to find an article from a credible news outlet that describes an example of questionable ethical behaviour in business. Having selected your example, you will analyse it using one of the ethical standards discussed in class in Week 2. In your Essay you will: Clearly describe your chosen example of questionable ethical behaviour by a business organisation. Use one of the three ethical standards discussed in class (i.e. either ethics-as-consequences or ethics-as-categorical-rules or the Mauri Model) to assess whether this behaviour is ethically acceptable or not. Your conclusions must be supported by clear and logical reasoning. Explain what the business organisation would need to do differently in order to act ethically in this situation. 	
	NOTES:	
	 The example of "questionable ethical behaviour in business" must be drawn from an article published by a credible news outlet. You must find this example yourself. Do NOT use an example that we have discussed in the course content. The article that you choose must have been published in 2020. Your Essay must refer to the assigned reading and the additional online resources for Week 2 (Ethical Decision-Making).

Requirements	At this year's New Zealand General Election (September 19) voters will be asked to vote on two Referendum Issues: (1) the End of Life Choice Bill and (2) the legalisation and control of cannabis.
	The Ethical Analysis Essay requires you to choose <u>one</u> of these two issues. Having selected your issue, you will analyse it using one of the ethical standards discussed in class in Week 2. In your Essay you will:
	Clearly describe your chosen Referendum Issue and explain why it can be considered an ethical issue.
	2. Use <u>one</u> of the three ethical standards discussed in class (i.e. either ethics-as-consequences or ethics-as-categorical-rules or the Mauri Model) to help you determine whether you think it would be ethical to vote 'Yes' or 'No' on this issue. <u>Your conclusions must be supported by clear and logical reasoning</u> .
	3. Still drawing on the ethical standards discussed in class, explain why another voter might believe it is ethical to come to a different conclusion than you did.

	 a. Explain your selected social or environmental problem in a way that clearly demonstrates its severity and urgency. Show the precise harms that this problem causes for people, communities and/or the environment. b. Describe how business activity has been involved in creating this problem. Provide examples of business organisations whose activities have caused significant harm.
	 c. Describe the ways in which two business organisations have taken the lead in addressing this problem. d. Explain the broader lessons that other businesses could learn from the examples of "best practice" described in (c).
	Your Report must refer to assigned readings and class resources for Weeks 6 - 10. You will also need to do your own additional research.
